### Achieving excellence in a happy, nurturing and safe environment

As we come to the end of another successful school year, we are proud to reflect on the many achievements, experiences, and milestones that have shaped 2024–2025 at Friars. Our dedicated staff have continued to develop and improve the curriculum and welfare we offer, always guided by our school values.

### **Curriculum and Enrichment Highlights**

- We were thrilled to take part in creative projects with the Unicorn Theatre, Tate Modern, Box Clever Theatre, and more—enriching our pupils' learning through the arts.
- Classes enjoyed a wide range of curriculum-based trips and visits, bringing classroom learning to life.
- Children also performed in concerts at Southwark Cathedral, St George's, The Scoop by City Hall, and even the House of Lords.
- Pupils produced impressive homework projects linked to their curriculum topics, showcasing creativity, research skills, and independent learning.
- Children in Early Years and Year 1 enjoyed using our new outdoor play areas, which have become vibrant spaces for exploration, collaboration, and imaginative play.
- We launched a Music Academy in the spring term, led by Jonathan Pix and students from King's College, and sponsored by Water City Music. This initiative has given children in Years 4 and 5 the opportunity to learn instruments and perform—an exciting programme that will continue next year.
- Years 5 and 6 enjoyed a memorable residential trip to Wick Court, where they became farmers for the week and took part in a wide range of hands-on, outdoor activities.
- One of our school improvement priorities this year was to strengthen pupils' oracy skills. The introduction of a monthly 'Newsround' has inspired many students to present, interview, and perform on camera—capturing and sharing highlights of our school's learning and events.

### **Wellbeing and Support**

- We continued working with The Nest, a Peckham-based mental health charity who
  have run wellbeing workshops and therapeutic sessions for children.
- We launched parent workshops to explain how we teach phonics and maths, helping families support learning at home.

• Fatima continues to support with attendance and family liaison. Although this has improved, it is not yet where it needs to be to ensure that all children are in school at least 95% of the year. We ask that parents continue to talk to us if they are experiencing difficulties or need more of a network of support with this.

### Aspirations and Achievement

- Year 6 took part in Into University Week, a fantastic opportunity to raise aspirations and build teamwork.
- We administered national assessments across the school, including:
- Year 1 Phonics Screening
- Year 4 Multiplication Check
- Key Stage 2 SATs in Reading, Writing, Maths, Grammar, and Spelling
- Children have achieved highly and made very strong progress. We are above National Averages for all year groups.

### Celebrations and Community

- Our Wellbeing Week began with a joyful Sports Day, supported by many parents, and ended with a fun-filled Wellbeing Day featuring a bouncy castle and art activities.
- We came together as a school community for a Summer Fair, Christmas productions, dance and drumming performances, celebrating creativity and togetherness.
- Our Year 6 Leavers' Production was a heartfelt farewell, and we wish all our leavers the very best as they move on to secondary school.
- We welcomed our new early years children to visit and meet each other and see their new classrooms and outdoor spaces. We look forward to welcoming them to Friars.
